Lynita's Ponderings



"WOKE"? WHAT'S THAT?

Anyone who has a basic knowledge of the English language knows that the word "woke" is the past tense of "wake", as in the sentence: "I woke up at 7 o'clock this morning". And, of course, the word is still used in this way. However, as languages are dynamic, words take on new meanings. Way back in



1938, after several black men in America were falsely accused of rape, they coined the term "woke", which means staying awake, being aware, of racial discrimination. Over time, this term was used in other contexts, such as awareness of the rights of other groups, such as women, people of varying sexual orientations and people with disabilities.

Many organisations, including the Methodist Church in Britain, are becoming increasingly aware of the fact that the world can no longer be dominated by only one group of people. And in order to create greater awareness, organisations develop programmes which are called Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI). (In the USA these seem to be referred to as DEI). These programmes, in themselves, may not change attitudes, but they are at least an attempt to address the many inequalities which still exist in our society.

Unfortunately, both in this country and in the USA, the original meaning of the word "woke" has been vilified and demonised. It is as if some people feel very threatened by voices that were silent for centuries and are starting to speak up. There are those who dismiss EDI programmes as "woke" in the negative sense of the word. And over the past few weeks, we have seen the rise of the "anti-woke" culture, in which any group that does not fit the majority is scapegoated, blamed, victimised.

But why focus on this topic in a circuit magazine? Surely, this is entering the political arena? To some extent that is true. However, we will soon be starting our journey through Lent towards Easter. Lent prepares us to commemorate the death of Jesus and the fact that he was raised from the dead. But that begs the question: why was Jesus killed? And the answer is that he took notice of and gave dignity to the poor, those in captivity, the oppressed, the blind, lepers, the list goes on. The establishment could not cope with the fact that Jesus placed these groups centre stage. And I would suggest that if Jesus was walking the earth in physical form in our time, he would have been accused of being "woke" in the negative sense.

Lynita's Ponderings

Our challenge as Christ followers and the church, is to reclaim the concept of being "woke" in the positive sense. If we want to be true to Jesus' agenda, then we must be prepared to be "woke", even though this may result in our being vilified and victimised.

Dr Michael Waters is the founding pastor of an AME church in Dallas. In a sermon preached just before the 2016 US election, he said the following, words which are appropriate for us now:

"When the church is woke, new life comes to dead situations and overcomes fatal circumstances. When the church is woke, the captives are set free. When the church is woke, signs and wonders follow. When the church is woke, healing and deliverance take place. When the church is woke, the people are not condemned, but they are empowered."

(This sermon is quoted in a book edited by Phil Snider entitled Preaching as Resistance 2018, Chalice Press).

WEALDSTONE BABY BANK

Wealdstone Baby Bank

Baby banks are voluntary organisations providing vital support to families in local communities. They receive donations of essential items for babies and children such as clothes, toys, books and equipment which are quickly grown out of and pass them on for free, from one family to another. This has two advantages: firstly, to help parents with the financial costs of providing for young children and secondly, as a way of recycling goods and giving them a longer useful life, which

Wealdstone Baby Bank (WBB) opened at the Methodist Church in April 2021, complying with covid regulations that were still in place then. The numbers of families attending have grown steadily since the beginning and have had to be limited to Harrow residents only. At the end of last year, a second session on Tuesday afternoon has opened to help deal with the demand. Any family can attend, they do not need a referral from another agency but must register on their first visit and then

brings environmental benefits.



check in each time they visit so we have a record of who is attending. Numbers vary but about 100 families in total usually attend each week. Some people come regularly, others occasionally.

The main age range being catered for is 0-5 years but donations of clothes may include articles suitable for slightly older children. What can be provided is dependent on what is donated. There is seldom a problem with clothing or toys as supply exceeds demand, especially for very young babies. Buggies or pushchairs are a different matter – parents must sign up if they wish for one and there is a very long waiting list. The one item that has to be bought are the disposable nappies and these have been funded through various grants and donations. A record is kept and families can only receive one pack per fortnight. Money, things and time have been donated from several charity shops, local schools and businesses, private nurseries, a school and knitting groups. Thanks also to Pinner Methodist Church for their generous support.

Another linked but separate development has been the establishment of a discussion group



which offers mothers in the locality a chance to meet at the church socially as well as discuss a range of parenting concerns or hear from visiting health professionals.

Recognition of the group is increasing. Wealdstone Baby Bank has been a finalist in Harrow's Heroes awards twice in the last three years. In November 2024, Wealdstone Baby Bank was

also announced as one of six winners of a North West London Health Equity Award by the NW London Integrated Care Board, part of the NHS.



In November, WBB achieved fame by being featured briefly, but broadcast live, on ITV's 'Lorraine' morning programme as part of the Big Baby Bank Appeal the show was running to highlight the work of baby banks. We were visited by Dr Amir Khan and the production crew and rehearsals were needed to ensure the timing was right for our 3 minutes in the limelight!

The Baby Bank couldn't be happening in the way it is without the generous support of Wealdstone Methodist Church in providing the venue and storage space. It is a good location being by a bus stop and close to the shops. WBB is run by a team of volunteers whose diversity is one of its strengths. There are those who are retired, often from work with young children and their families, and also younger mums; those of different denominations, faiths and none; those from different countries who bring the advantage



of speaking some of the community languages. There is plenty to do from transforming an empty hall into an inviting hub full of good quality things and then putting all the stuff away again at the end of the session, receiving and sorting donations of clothes, toys and other things as well as



chatting with those coming in and trying to help them find what they need.

With the cost-of-living crisis continuing, it is likely that families will need support from the Baby Bank for the foreseeable future and it is hoped that it will be possible to go on providing this service at Wealdstone.

If you have any items to donate please can these be brought to the church on a Friday morning between 9 and 11am.

Monetary donations are also welcome.

The Word in all its fullness


Bible Month 2025: John's Gospel

Bible Month has been part of Methodist life for the last few years. It celebrates Scripture by inviting the whole Methodist Church to focus on one particular book of the Bible. In previous years it has included Ruth, Genesis and Revelation amongst others. Now, in 2025, it is the turn of John's Gospel.

Of course, one month cannot do justice to any biblical book, let alone John's Gospel. But it gives people the chance to look at a book through different themes (or lenses), rather than just focussing on particular passages as on Sundays.

Bible Month can be invaluable in deepening both an understanding and love of scripture. The time spent together, digging deeper into God's Word, also builds relationships and is a chance to share and learn together.



The Methodist Church prepares a variety of resources, including house group material, preaching notes, craft ideas for all ages and journalling suggestions, as well as a daily reading guide. It is backed up with short videos, training days and webinars. It is up to churches or individuals to decide how they want to use and engage with the material.

Many churches celebrate Bible Month in June and many of the resources are timed towards that. But you can choose any time of the year.

The resource material has just been published and ministers, local preachers and worship leaders will be looking at it in their March meeting. Ask them or others in your church what you might do together.

In previous years, churches in the circuit have run house groups across a section, and one church has used the selected book for its praise service. But it's entirely up to you. If Bible Month has whet your appetite to dive deeper into Scripture in whatever way, then it will have succeeded.
